Homeless Funding Overview:



Homeless Services funding in the county comes from at least 42 different sources (state, federal, local) from 12 different agencies/jurisdictions.



The use of funds, funding timelines and reporting requirements are not consistent.



Most projects rely on more than one source of funds to operate a project.

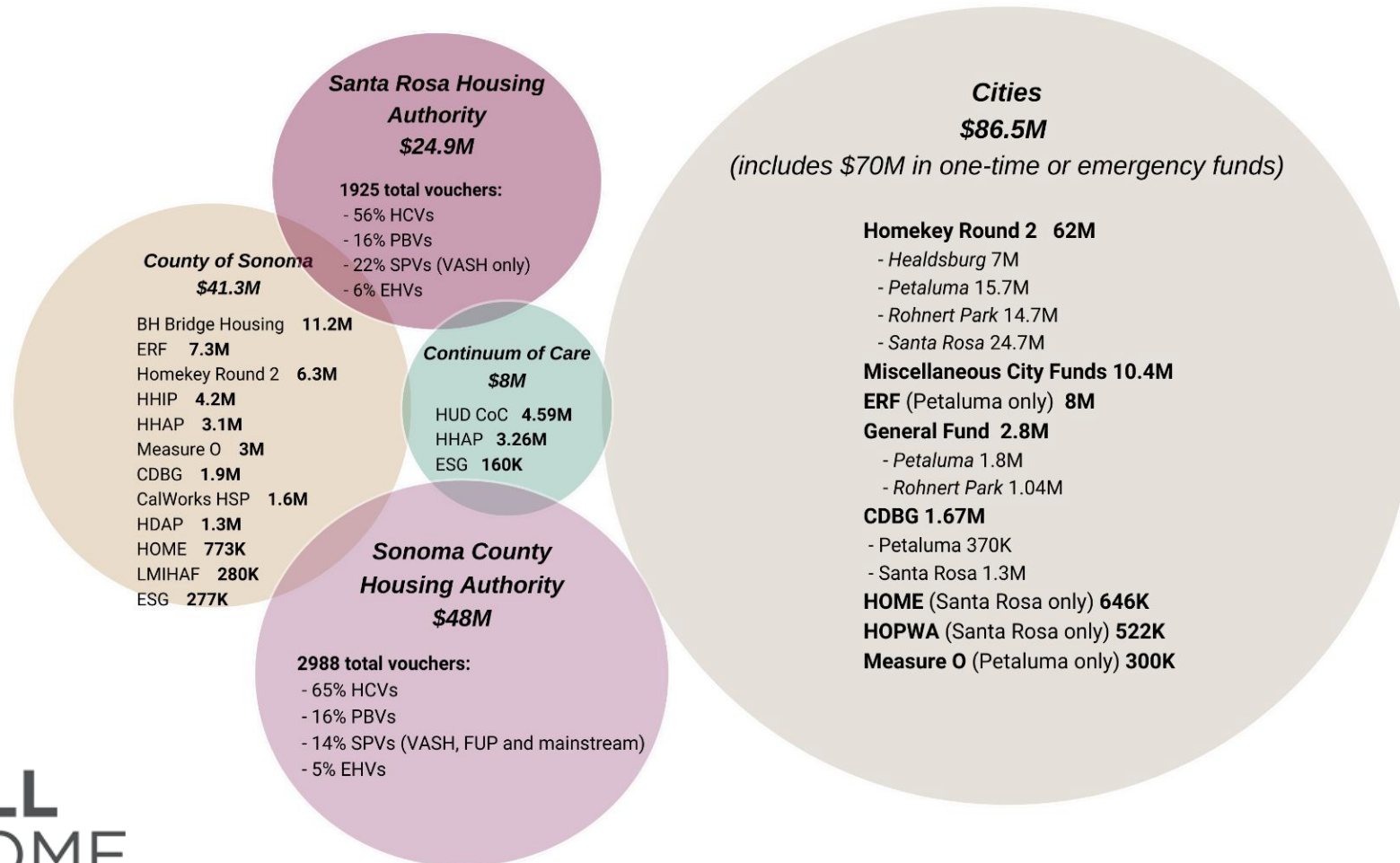


Many funding sources are not guaranteed year over year.



Long Term Investment Plan was compiled by All Home and DHS staff in early 2024 based on FY 23-24 info; very different funding environment in 25/26. (*See Next Slide*).

Funding Sources:

- Sources include funds such as HHAP, HHIP, ESG (*State*), CoC/HUD (*Federal*), General Fund (*Local*).
- Funding for the Housing Authorities, including vouchers and HUD-VASH vouchers (*Federal*).
- City funds, including both city general fund and funds allocated to Santa Rosa and Petaluma such as HOME/HOME-ARP (*State/Fed*).
- Behavioral Health funding is still being tabulated; will shift in FY 25-26 with anticipated BHSA/Prop 1 funds (*State*).
- Measure O or other special local funds (*Local*).

Looking Forward:



Staff has accounted for most of the funding allocated to homeless services in the County for FY 25/26, but it is imprecise.

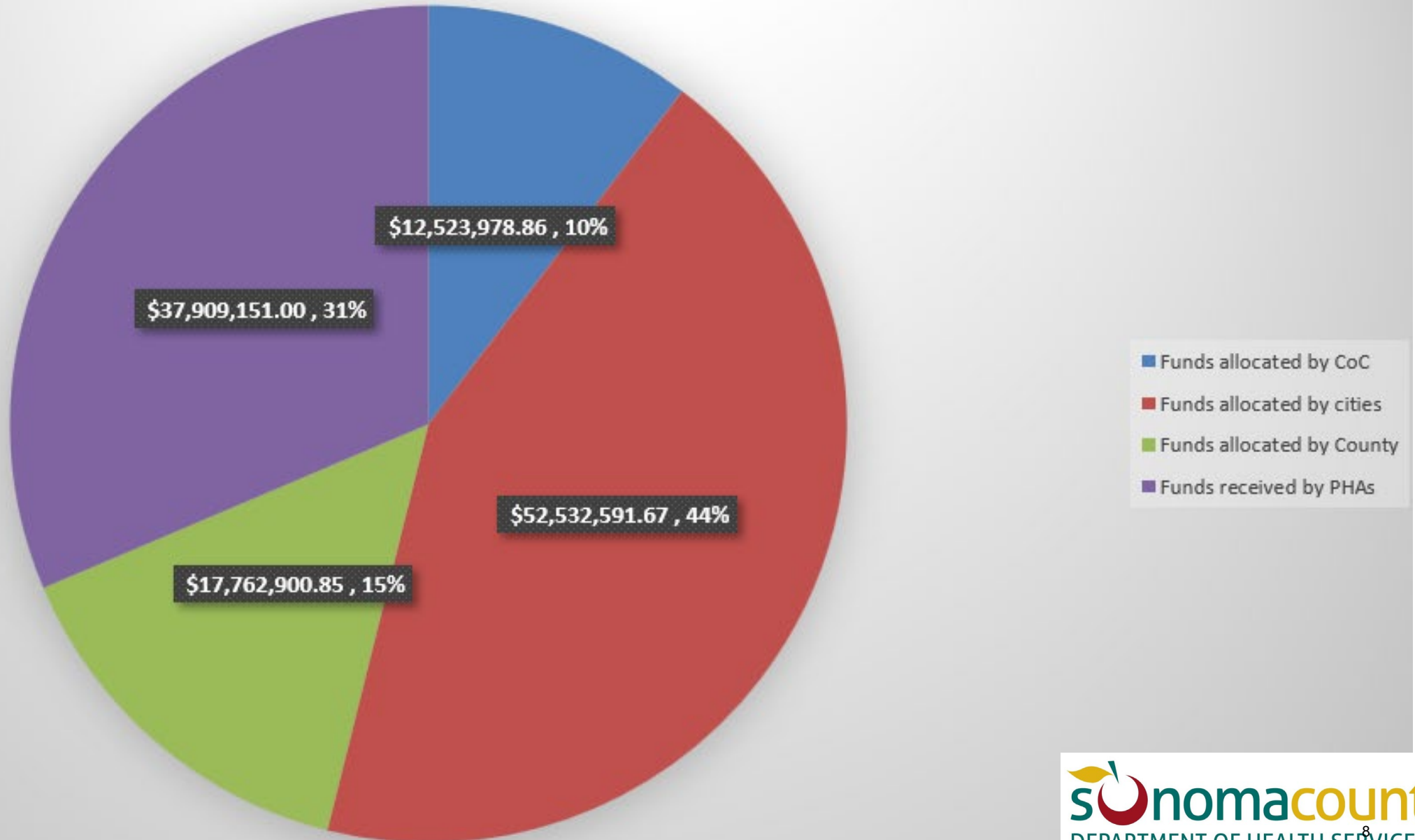


Some amounts are estimates as staff could not get information from all entities. There is no central repository for this information.

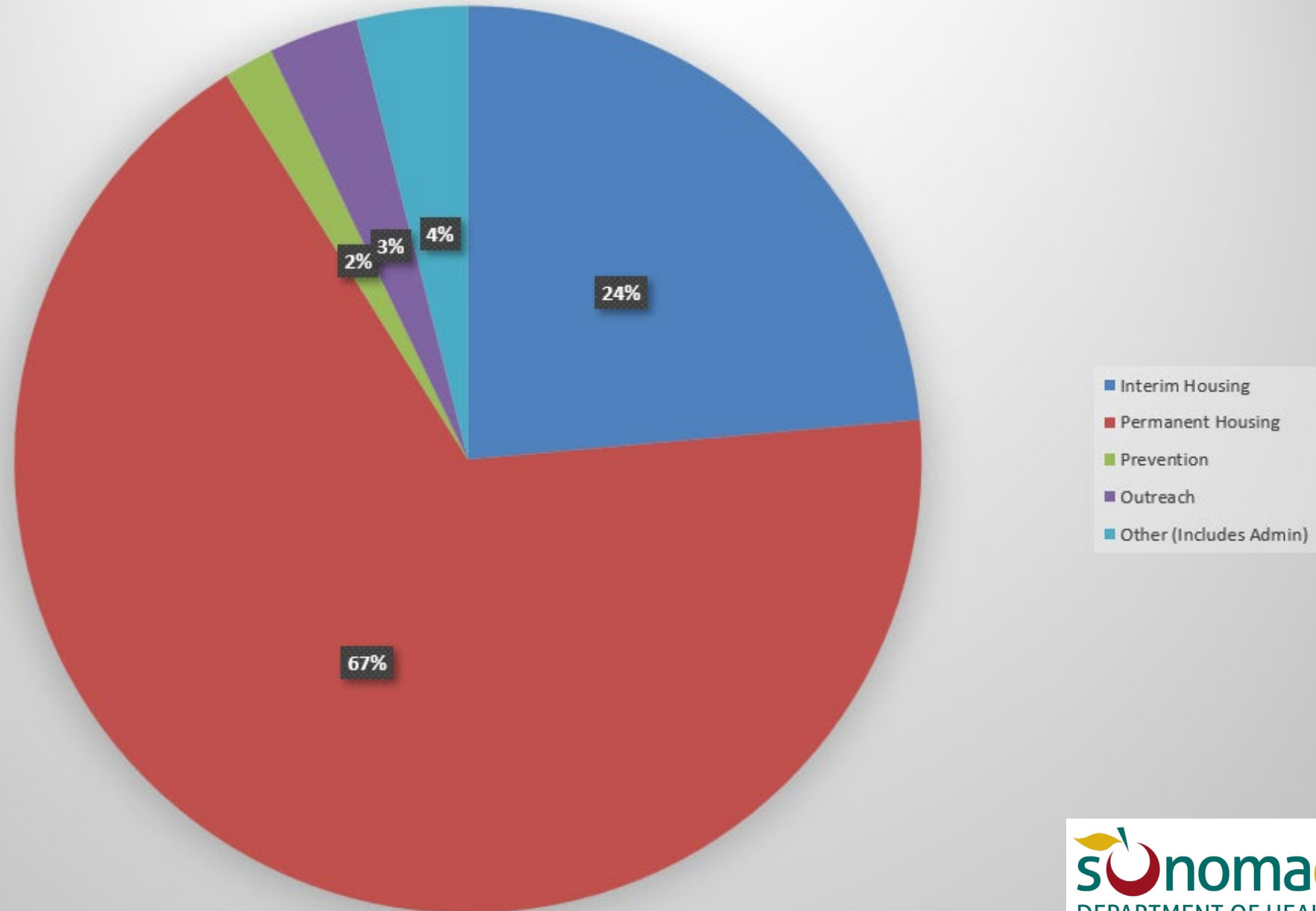


For FY 25/26 approximately **\$120,728,622** has been allocated; however, a large portion of this is residual one-time funding that is ending.

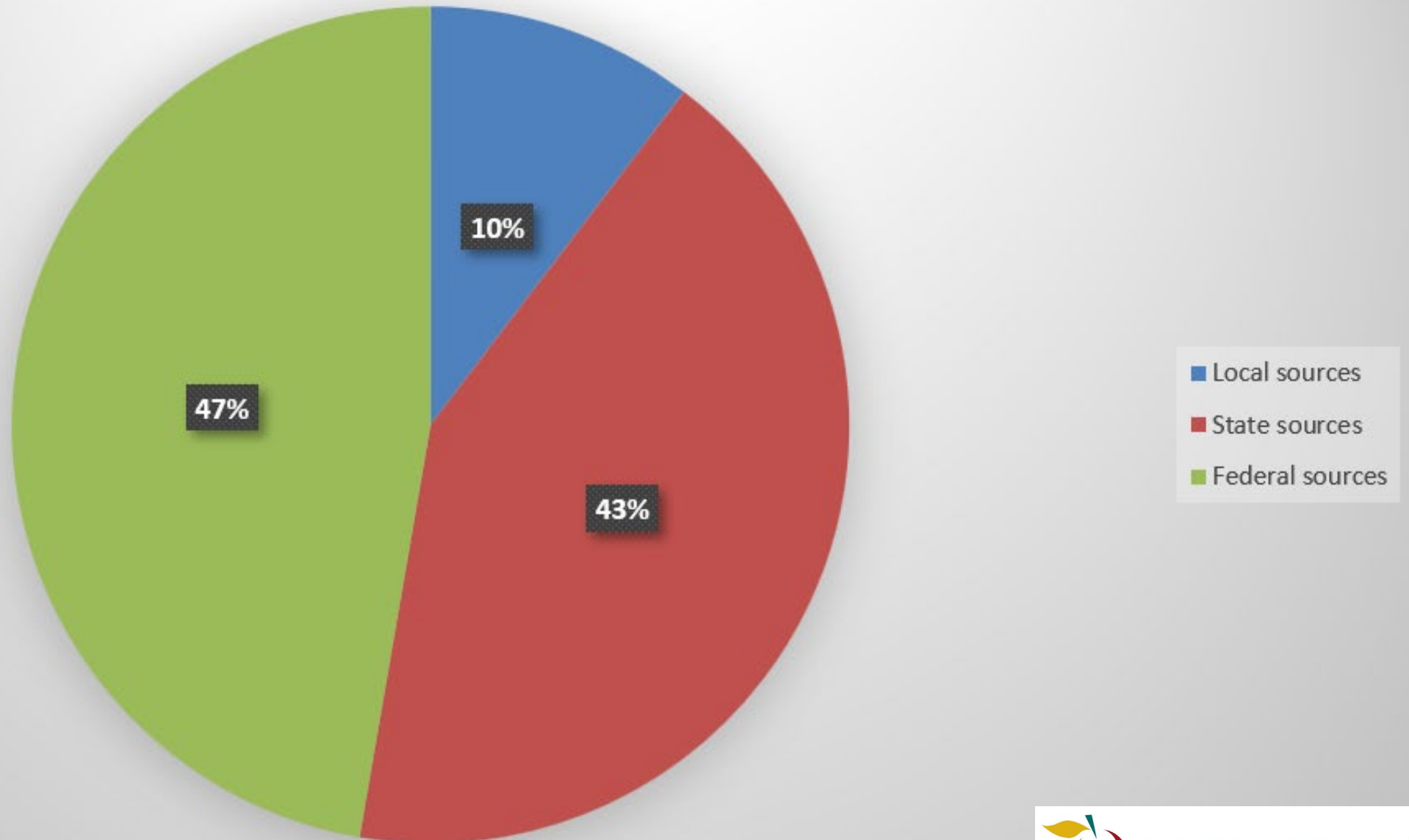
Funding by Entity/Jurisdiction

Measure O

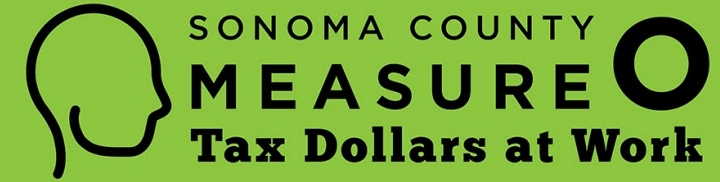


Voter-approved, Sonoma County initiative that established a quarter-cent sales tax to fund mental health and homelessness services for 10 years. The measure, passed in November 2020, is projected to generate approximately \$25 million annually.

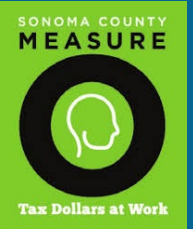

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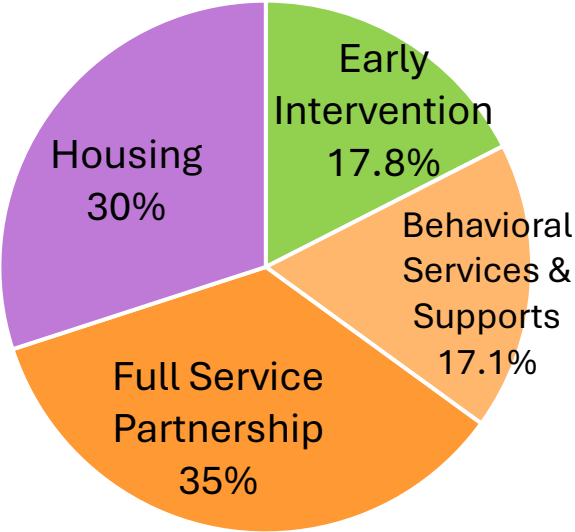

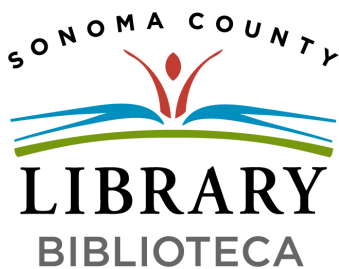

Sonoma County Library is embarking on a new strategic plan!

Strategic plans are essential tools that help public institutions like libraries remain focused, responsive, and future-ready. They provide a clear framework for aligning services, resources, and priorities with the evolving needs of the communities we serve. A strong strategic plan sets measurable goals, tracks progress over time, and

ensures transparency and accountability—while remaining adaptable to change.

Sonoma County Library's Reimagining Plan launched in 2019 after extensive community input. The COVID-19 pandemic delayed implementation, but since resuming in 2021, staff have made strong progress—expanding access, advancing equity, improving infrastructure, and engaging the community.

Yet, much has changed since then. New technologies, shifting demographics, growing literacy needs, and persistent social and economic

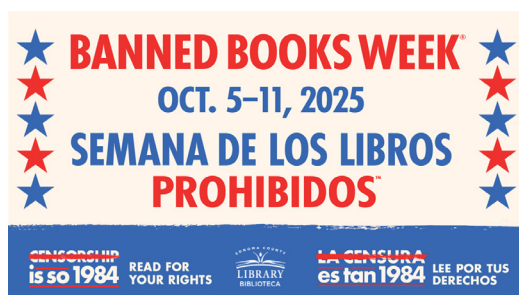
challenges call for a renewed vision and strategy. A new strategic plan will allow the Library to build on past successes while clearly defining our path forward.

The new strategic plan will establish bold yet achievable goals and clear timelines, grounded in meaningful community input and robust staff collaboration. Over the next nine months, Sonoma County Library will partner with its strategic planning consultant, The Ivy Group, to lead an inclusive and transparent planning process.

As part of this effort, stakeholder listening sessions with staff, Library Advisory Boards, and Friends of the Library groups will be held during the week of October 13–18. A full schedule and additional details will be shared soon.

This is just the beginning—there will be multiple opportunities for broader community engagement, including a public survey and community-wide listening sessions planned for early January. Your voice will help shape the future of the Library.

By investing in strategic planning, Sonoma County Library reaffirms its commitment to be a dynamic, equitable, and forward-looking institution—for today, and for generations to come.

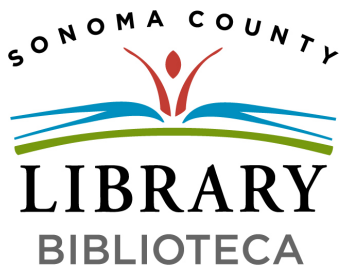

Planificando el futuro de tu biblioteca

¡La Biblioteca del Condado de Sonoma se embarca en un nuevo plan estratégico!

Los planes estratégicos son herramientas fundamentales que ayudan a instituciones públicas como las bibliotecas a mantenerse enfocadas, receptivas y preparadas para el futuro. Proporcionan un marco claro para adaptar los servicios, recursos y prioridades a las necesidades cambiantes de las comunidades a las que servimos. Un plan estratégico sólido

establece objetivos medibles, realiza un seguimiento del progreso a lo largo del tiempo y garantiza la transparencia y la rendición de cuentas, sin dejar de adaptarse a los cambios.

El Plan de reinversión de la Biblioteca del Condado de Sonoma se lanzó en 2019 después de una amplia participación de la comunidad. La pandemia del COVID-19 retrasó la implementación, pero desde que se reanudó en 2021, el personal ha realizado grandes progresos: expandió el acceso, promovió la equidad, mejoró la infraestructura y fortaleció la participación de la comunidad.

Sin embargo, mucho ha cambiado desde entonces. Las nuevas tecnologías, los cambios demográficos, las crecientes necesidades de alfabetización y los persistentes retos sociales y económicos exigen una

visión y una estrategia renovadas. Un nuevo plan estratégico permitirá a la biblioteca aprovechar los éxitos del pasado y definir claramente nuestro camino a seguir.

El nuevo plan estratégico establecerá objetivos audaces pero alcanzables, y cronogramas claros, basados en una participación significativa de la comunidad y en una sólida colaboración del personal. Durante los próximos nueve meses, la Biblioteca del Condado de Sonoma se asociará con una compañía consultora de planificación estratégica, The Ivy Group, para dirigir un proceso de planificación inclusivo y transparente.

Como parte de este esfuerzo, durante la semana del 13 al 18 de octubre, se llevarán a cabo sesiones de intercambio de opiniones con el personal, las juntas de asesoría de la Biblioteca y los grupos de los Amigos de la Biblioteca. Próximamente se publicará el programa completo y los detalles adicionales.

Esto es solo el inicio. Habrá múltiples oportunidades para ampliar la participación de la comunidad, incluida una encuesta pública y sesiones de intercambio de opiniones en toda la comunidad previstas para principios de enero. Tu voz ayudará a crear el futuro de la biblioteca.

Al invertir en la planificación estratégica, la Biblioteca del Condado de Sonoma reafirma su compromiso de ser una institución dinámica, equitativa y visionaria, para el presente y las generaciones venideras.
